TWENTY-SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Jesus must have shocked the priests and elders when he said that prostitutes and tax collectors would enter the kingdom of God before them. After all, his listeners had spent their whole lives being faithful to the Law. But Jesus' point was not so much about final salvation as about our daily choices. Remember the parable about the two sons. The second son said what his father wanted to hear, with no intention of doing it. The first was honest about not wanting to go to the vineyard, but then decided to do it anyway. I suspect the father of those men knew what each would or would not do. And whom do we want to imitate? Are we honest enough to look at our lives and repent of our hatred, our selfishness, or whatever keeps us in sin, and then to follow Jesus with our whole heart? We may not always like doing what God asks of us, but God is an understanding Father who can accept our weaknesses and forgive them when we are ready to return to him.

Reflexion del la Escritura de Hoy

¿CON QUÉ AUTORIDAD?

El Evangelio de hoy describe la segunda mitad de un argumento entre Jesús y los sumos sacerdotes y los ancianos del pueblo. Le preguntaron: ¿con qué autoridad haces estas cosas? Mucho de esta discusión fue acerca de la autoridad. ¿Cómo era posible que Jesús dijera que representaba los propósitos de Dios? Esta pregunta sigue escuchándose hasta el día de hoy. ¿Quién habla por Dios? ¿Quién no lo hace? ¿Cómo podemos diferenciarlos? La respuesta de Jesús es ver a la evidencia. Miren cómo, en respuesta a Juan el Bautista y a Jesús, las personas son sanadas del cuerpo y el alma. Miren cómo las personas encontraron una nueva intimidad con Dios, y cómo cambiaron sus vidas de pecado. La autoridad de Juan y Jesús reposa no en algunos puestos de las instituciones religiosas, sino en la gracia y evidente fuerza sanadora de Juan y Jesús.

CAMBIANDO LA MENTE

Hoy las lecturas ponen claro que para ser un seguidor de Jesús uno tiene que cambiar la mente. Más precisamente, debemos permitir que Dios nos cambie, transforme nuestras mentes. Para muchos de nosotros, esto puede ser verdaderamente difícil. Es por esto que las lecturas hablan mucho acerca de la humildad. La humildad abre nuestra capacidad para ser transformados. La humildad nos permite cambiar nuestra forma de pensar y nuestro comportamiento, para así poder evitar por un lado la auto justificación, y por otro lado la auto denigración. La humildad puede cultivarse en la práctica de la reflexión. Esto podría significar dedicar un tiempo específico a Dios dentro de nuestra ocupada lista de las ajenas obligaciones. Esto podría significar dedicar un tiempo específico para un retiro de un día de tranquilidad, quizá con la ayuda de un director espiritual. La humildad también puede cultivarse en obras de servicio. Conocemos de la humildad de Jesús en el lavatorio de pies. Podemos poner nuestros intereses por delante de los nuestros, y renunciamos a nuestra necesidad de estar en control. Today's Scripture Reflection

Today's Gospel comes to us from Matthew, Chapter 21. As we hear the Word of the Lord in segments, which is the nature of our readings, it is sometimes good to know what may have occurred just prior to this moment. Chapter 21 opens with Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem on the way to His Crucifixion. This particular Gospel is part of His response to the Pharisees who challenge Jesus' right and authority to teach.

The first two readings on this Twenty-sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time are tied to conversion. The Gospel might refer to the action required after that conversion. The First Reading is from the Old Testament Book of Ezekiel. As mentioned previously Ezekiel was a contemporary of Jeremiah. Both lived during the time of the fall of Jerusalem, and both were among those who were exiled to Babylon. One of Ezekiel's most common themes was that of the conversion of Israel.

Ezekiel's point was that conversion had to occur for Israel for the people to be saved and to fulfill their promise. That is true of all of us. We often say that conversion is an important part of becoming a good steward, but it is also an ongoing reality for us as Catholic and Christians. Ezekiel is speaking metaphorically about Israel in today's reading when he states, "But if he turns from the wickedness he has committed, he does what is right and just, he shall preserve his life." Being a steward may not seem like a matter of life and death to us. However, it is the kind of life to which Christ calls us. The Lord, like Ezekiel, often talks about true life and what it means. It involves discipleship and being alert to God's call to us.

In his Letter to the Philippians, our Second Reading, St. Paul advises us, "Have in you the same attitude that is also in Christ Jesus." Paul goes on to say, speaking of the Lord, "...he humbled himself." To really embrace humility and to truly put others ahead of ourselves certainly requires conversion on our part. If anyone understood conversion, it was Paul whose own conversion story and experience are well known.

Basically in this passage Paul is explaining to the Philippians how they need to live, and especially how they need to relate to one another. When Paul tells us, "...complete my joy, by being of the same mind, with the same love, united in heart, thinking of one thing," he is really speaking of something we may share called "fellowship." In ancient Greek the word for fellowship is *kononia*. That means sharing things in common, and Paul wants us to appreciate that we share life with the Spirit of God. It is the Holy Spirit who guides and moves our lives in a powerful and precious way. To fully embrace this spirit also requires conversion of mind and heart for us.

Our Gospel Reading from Matthew is popularly called the Parable of the Two Sons. The basic story is of a man with two sons who told them to go work in the vineyard. The first son refused, but later obeyed and went. The second son initially expressed obedience, but actually disobeyed and refused to work in the vineyard. The son who ultimately did the will of his father was the first son because he eventually obeyed. The point of this parable is what matters is living for God, not lip service to that life. The religious leaders to whom Jesus was speaking were good at talking a righteous walk, but their stubbornly unrepentant hearts show that repentant sinners will enter the kingdom before them.

The father is God. The first son, who flatly refuses to work in the vineyard, represents the weak and foolish of this world. The second son, who promises to work yet never shows up, represents hypocrites, those who appear or profess one way but act another. The work the father asks them to do corresponds to living God's way of life. In the parable both sons hear and respond verbally to their father's command, one negatively, one positively. The one who promises to obey but never follows through is just as guilty as if he had refused from the first. Though his promise to work may make him look good on the surface, his father will never accept his act of disobedience.

We need to ask ourselves, "Where are we in our commitment to God, in our promise of discipleship?" The warning to us is not to be a son who promises to work, then neglects to keep his word. God has called us, and we have accepted that calling, promising we would work. Now we must perform what we have promised. This may require conversion, but it most certainly requires commitment and persistence.

Stewardship: Step Back and See the Whole Picture

Many years ago, I participated in a one-week course for those who teach others through reflections on the Sunday readings. Many of the participants were clergy who were honing their skills in homiletics. A few of us were responsible for the RCIA and adult faith formation, and a few were seminarians and men who were in formation for religious orders. The course included a requirement (some truly embraced this as an opportunity, and others, a step that had to be taken) that each person would present a reflection to a small group. The reflection was videotaped and group members critiqued each other's work, with the guidance of an experienced coach. I distinctly recall being in awe of a young man who was a Jesuit scholastic. In his reflection on the Holy Trinity, he reminded us that it isn't enough to see the individual parts of the Trinity, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. "You have to step back and see the whole picture," he told us.

I recalled this experience as I was reading *Stewardship: A Disciple's Response* today. Following the reflection on the parable of the talents, the U.S. bishops turn to "the steward's reward":

Giving up means receiving more, including more responsibility as a steward; among the consequences of living this way will be persecution; and even though discipleship and stewardship set the necessary terms of Christian life in this world, they have their ultimate reward in another life (SDR, 20).

In other words, you have to step back and see the whole picture. We can sometimes lose perspective by getting too close to the elements of our lives. We may feel a strong sense of responsibility, or we might be experiencing a time of particular challenge. We may be committed to living as a disciple of Jesus, and, like many who have gone before us, we may be shunned or persecuted as a result. The whole picture is of a life lived with the present and the eternal in view. We grow to see that stewardship is a way of following Jesus, who lived and died for others, and who leads us into eternal life with God.

I recently began to have Vertigo. I found an article with useful information to share.

Dizziness can result from many conditions: low blood pressure, migraines, ear infections, fluid buildup in the inner ear and a condition called benign paroxysmal positioning vertigo.

It can happen at any age – but most common in people ages 60 and older. It's temporary and usually harmless. But it can increase the risk of falling. See your doctor if you often feel dizzy – or if it is accompanied by fever, chest pain or vomiting.

Dehydration can make you feel light-headed when you suddenly change positions. Women should drink 9 cups of fluid a day; men, 11 cups.

Exercise also helps because it strengthens your balance by stimulating different parts of the body to work together with the brain.

Ask your doctor about your medications. Many common medications list dizziness as a side effect they can affect the inner ear.

Sit down or brace yourself to prevent a fall when you feel dizzy. Once you are stable, breathe deeply and focus on the farthest spot to help your brain reestablish equilibrium.

Repositioning exercises. A series of head maneuvers called Epley Maneuver by shifting tiny loose inner-ear particles into areas where they won't disturb balance. Up to 80% of people find that one or two treatments can improve vertigo.

Hace poco comencé a tener Vertigo. Encontré un artículo con información útil para compartir.

Mareo puede resultar de muchas condiciones: presión arterial baja, migrañas, infecciones de oído, acumulación de líquido en el oído interno y una condición llamada vertigo.

Puede ocurrir a cualquier edad, pero es más común en personas de 60 años o más. Es temporal y generalmente inofensivo. Pero puede aumentar el riesgo de caídas. Consulte a su médico si a menudo se siente mareado o si está acompañado de fiebre, dolor en el pecho o vómitos.

La deshidratación puede hacer que se sienta mareado cuando de repente cambia de posición. Las mujeres deben beber 9 tazas de líquido al día; hombres, 11 tazas.

El ejercicio también ayuda porque fortalece su equilibrio.

Pregúntele a su médico acerca de sus medicamentos. Muchos medicamentos comunes causan los mareos como un efecto secundario.

Siéntese o prepárese para prevenir una caída cuando se sienta mareado. Una vez que esté estable, respire profundamente y concentrarse para ayudar a su cerebro a restablecer el equilibrio.

Ejercicios de reposicionamiento. Una serie de maniobras de cabeza ayudan cambiar pequeñas partículas sueltas del oído interno hacia áreas donde no perturban el equilibrio. Hasta el 80% de las personas encuentran que uno o dos tratamientos pueden mejorar el vértigo.
